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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Metropolitan Planning Commission (MPC) was asked in 2016 to conduct a review and update of the City's zoning ordinance since Knoxville's zoning ordinance hasn't undergone a thorough review in half a century, and many of the current provisions are so obsolete that they hinder quality sustainable development.

The MPC conducts the project through the use of different resources like public workshops, open houses, and surveys to the community.

The MPC reaches different communities by partnering with other organizations like SEEED and Centro Hispano. Centro was responsible for outreach to Spanish speakers, publicity, and surveys for the Spanish speaking population.

The activities conducted by Centro Hispano for RECODE KNOXVILLE included:

RECODE KNOXVILLE information material translation

Translations of the MPC Zoning 101 guide, the introduction to the online survey, and survey from English to Spanish were made by Jacquelinne Padilla, former Information and Referral Coordinator at Centro Hispano.

• Social media communication

Translations were made and posted by Jacquelinne Padilla, former Information and referral coordinator at Centro Hispano in Spanish and English.

• Community Outreach: Group talk and Zoning 101 document delivery.

o The project goals, activities and documentation were presented by Jacquelinne Padilla and Hilda Castillo with a total of 8 community presentations at Centro Hispano discussing RECODE and talking about Zoning, and completing surveys.

Survey

- The survey questions were developed by the Metropolitan Planning Commission of Knoxville City following a long-term strategy for the City Recode.
- o Surveys were performed by Jacquelinne Padilla and Hilda Castillo.
- Jacquelinne Padilla conducted community meetings and surveys at Centro Hispano with clients who attend the Centro ESL program. She conducted workshops in Spanish for 3 groups in the morning and 5 groups at night for 52 participants. These community presentations were conducted in small groups because many of Centro's Spanish speaking clients lack basic knowledge about the concept of zoning. Smaller groups, familiar with each other, were more likely to ask questions. Hilda Castillo was in charge of reaching outside communities of Spanish speakers in Knoxville:

Data Collected:

- o Some surveys were performed at Centro Hispano through the computers available onsite
- o Because of the initial set-up of the online survey, we were not able to perform the survey twice on the same device, but it is available by opening a hidden window. Field surveys were completed on paper. The data collected is presented in this document.
- O Hilda Castillo performed 54 surveys on paper at 3 locations: Market Square downtown Knoxville, Chapman Highway near the Cancun Restaurant, and Sevier Avenue, South Knoxville near Pelancho's restaurant. The adequacy of the sample is supported by the fact that there were responses from 18 different zip codes, and the two largest groups of respondents were from different areas, South Knoxville 37920 and West Knoxville 37923.

DATA COLLECTED

92 persons completed the RECODE Survey in Spanish. 90% of respondents identified themselves as Latinos, 4% as white, 3% as indigenous, and 3% as other. The survey consisted of 13 questions, organized in 6 sections which are directly related to the main interest subjects of the Recode Knoxville Project: Neighborhoods, Corridors, Redevelopment, Neighborhood commercial areas, Sustainability and Demographic information of the respondents. The survey is 10 multiple choice questions and 3 open ended questions. The vocabulary and length of each questions was easy to understand with a main description for each section to help people to understand better the questions.

PARTICIPANT QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS AT COMMUNITY MEETINGS

A number of participants were unfamiliar with the definition of a duplex, condominium, apartment, and garage or basement apartments. Most respondents knew the zip code where they lived, but a large number of respondents were not familiar with the name of the area where they lived, giving answers such as near Kroger, Wendy's, or Walmart.

Lighting was identified as "very important" by 87% of respondents followed by height of buildings 77%, landscaping 75%, and parking 68%. (Q 8) There was strong support for regulation requiring preservation of trees, bushes, and open spaces. (90%, Q 9) Latino participants were excited about the prospect of allowing buildings to be used as bodegas (small grocery stores) and restaurants. More than 70% of respondents favored allowing different uses. (Q 6,7) The needs most frequently mentioned outside of survey parameters was the need for more sidewalks and more user friendly, accessible bus service. The desire for more sidewalks was at times accompanied by comments how West Knoxville received better services.

INTANGIBLE OBJECTIVES





3.- Should the zoning code allow for garage apartments, basement apartments, or a small residence in a free-standing building in addition to the main house on the lot?



4.- Most shopping areas along Knoxville's corridors do not allow residences. Should these areas also allow housing?



5.- Should new buildings along corridors be required to be separated from homes by trees and shrubs?





7.- Should the new zoning code allow to reuse of existing, small business buildings found in some neighborhoods?



11. Which of the following describes you? (Choose as many as necessary)


